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

Focus on the Ageing Dog

Some memories remain forever emblazoned in our minds, as they were associated with such powerful emotions at the time. Growing up on a farm with a horde of happy mutts, we used to take the whole crew for a run (behind the bakkie of course) to the river. We loved to watch them all in full flight. I recall one day as my dad stopped and dropped the tail gate to let them jump on I asked him to let them run a little more. When he told me they were tired I pointed out that they were still running! Of course in my mind, when you're tired, you stop running. Dogs are different he explained, they are loyal and will follow their master until they drop with fatigue. I cannot describe how this struck me. It changed the entire way in which I viewed the canine kind. I can understand why Mark Twain said that a dog is the only thing that loves you more than he loves himself!

So if your beloved pet is getting old, it may become more and more difficult for him to honour this loyalty. His greatest call in life is to be your trusted companion. Arthritis, heart disease, hormone diseases, lung diseases, kidney diseases and cancers all afflict our "senior citizen" pets. Often the signs of these problems are not obvious, because their drive to serve as a loyal companion outweighs their sense of being aware of their own physical constraints. Bear in mind that a yorkie or dachsie will fearlessly attack 5 thugs to protect its master. With this in mind it is our responsibility (much like a wife dragging her husband to the Doctor for a check!) to be proactive about the ageing pets health and well-being.

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At Hilton vet we are passionate about preserving the health and dignity of an ageing pet. Many of us have experienced the pain of having to let go of one of our old pets.

So what can I do to prolong the health of my ageing pet?

Have your old dog checked twice yearly to assess the teeth, heart, lungs and examine for lumps and bumps. If your dog has a reduced appetite, a chest x-ray or an abdominal scan may help to pick up problems like cancer early when they can still be successfully treated. At an annual vaccination ensure that your vet does a thorough check. At Hilton Vet we have a standard 40 point clinical exam for all pets' physical examinations. A 6 monthly inbetween check can be done by one of our nurses (free to our Hilton Vet clients) to screen for problems, and to decide if a check with one of the vets is necessary. If your old dog is on chronic medication such as anti-inflammatories, we have a fully equipped laboratory to perform screening blood tests as necessary to ensure the ongoing safety of the medication being used. Hilton clients are welcome to book our nurse Debbie to discuss the management of the senior pet. With our help and your care we hope to keep your old shadow plodding behind you for many years to come!

Intensive Care Unit

Martin and Richard receive referral patients requiring intensive care from all over KwaZulu Natal. The hospital is staffed and set up with intensive care equipment to offer 24 hour monitoring and treatment of critical patients. All animal domiciles are kitted out with comfortable mattresses and are temperature controlled. Cats are kept in a separate ward to the dogs. Infectious diseases are kept in a quarantine wards. We are also "Hilton compliant", with a threephase generator capable of running the entire hospital during our frequent Hilton "blackouts".

When dog parvovirus (cat flu) hit the canine population in the 70's, many a vet and owner alike stood helplessly and watched as puppies succumbed to this deadly disease. The development of modern vaccines has made this a distant memory in suburban areas, and yet the communities that have benefitted from this marvel of medicine are beginning to question the value of annual vaccination. Some clients have abandoned annual vaccination programmes along with dog foods and de-wormers, because they think that their pets have better chance of survival if they live naturally. The reality is that in the wild animals die of infectious diseases and do not enjoy the long healthy lives that our pets do! Another alarming fact is that in recent times outbreaks of distemper and canine parvovirus have occurred in countries like Sweden and the US. because people have become complacent given the reduced incidence of these diseases because of extensive vaccination programmes. So... the jury is in. Vaccination is important, have your pet vaccinated yearly. This gives your vet the opportunity to assess the health of your pet every year, as opposed to sporadically when he/she is sick.(This check up is done for free) There have been outbreaks of distemper in the Pietermaritzburg area. Please see our website for further information on preventable diseases.



The Fireworks season is now upon us. For the SPCA it is the busiest time of year. Pets are often found a long way from home and are exhausted, disorientated and sometimes injured. Please take precaution to safe guard your pets during this time. Dogs have been known to jump over high fences, they try and go through glass windows and doors and may even break any restrainers holding them back

You may want to consider the following to help your beloved pet:

- Keep your animals inside wherever possible
- Close curtains at night-time
- Close doors and windows
- Block off dog doors and cat flaps
- Give them medication if necessary
- Have your pet micro chipped so that if they do run away in fear, they can be identified and returned to you

Medications that can be used include:

- Anxitane tablets
- Nutricalm
- Alpraxolam
- Good behaviour pheromone collar
